EULOGISTS

John R. Chamberlin is a professor emeritus of political science and public policy at the University of Michigan. He was associate dean of the Gerald R. Ford School of Public Policy from 1999 to 2001, the beginning of Becky's time as Ford School dean. He was interim dean of the school before Becky arrived.

His research interests include ethics and public policy, professional ethics, and methods of election and representation. He has taught a wide variety of courses at the Ford School, including courses on statistics, ethics and public policy, and nonprofit management.

He was the founding director of the Ford School's BA in public policy program from 2007–2011, one of the key steps forward for the Ford School during Becky's deanship. He was director of UM's Center for Ethics in Public Life from 2008–2011. John has a BS in industrial engineering from Lehigh University and a PhD in decision sciences from the Graduate School of Business at Stanford University.

Mark Doms is the chief economist of the Congressional Budget Office. Becky recruited him to be the chief economist of the Economics and Statistics Administration, the component of the Department of Commerce that is the home to the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Economic Affairs, the agency responsible for measures of the economy such as the Gross Domestic Product (GDP). He succeeded Becky as the Commerce Department's Under Secretary for Economic Affairs.

Prior to the Department of Commerce, he had been at the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, the Research and Statistics Division of the Federal Reserve Board of Governors, and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

He received a PhD in economics from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1992.

Michael M. Knetter is the chief executive officer of the Wisconsin Foundation and Alumni Association. He was the only member of the University of Wisconsin–Madison executive team who was there both when Becky began her time as UW–Madison Chancellor and when she left. That fact made Becky think he could well reflect on her Wisconsin years.

Like Becky, Mike is a former dean. He joined the Wisconsin Foundation and Alumni Association in 2010 after eight years as dean of the Wisconsin School of Business. Becky and Mike traveled tens of thousands of miles together, shared many stages, and shook many of the same hands in endless pursuit of the Badger nation.

Mike completed his undergraduate studies in economics and mathematics at the University of Wisconsin–Eau Claire and his PhD in economics at Stanford University.

WORSHIP LEADER AND LITURGIST

Eldonna Hazen was called as the Senior Minister of First Congregational UCC in 2013. She is passionate about the intersection of faith and justice, and advocates for dignity and respect on behalf of ALL of God's children. Eldonna met Becky after Becky moved to Madison to start her position as Chancellor, having read about Becky's strong faith and commitment to justice. No one ever wants a life to be cut short as in this case, but Eldonna was honored to be able to accompany Becky on this faith-filled journey.

HOMILIST

Bliss Williams Browne first met Becky in the early 1990s when she was gathering people for conversations that gave birth to Imagine Chicago, an organization that works to cultivate hope and civic engagement in a variety of cross cultural and inter-generational initiatives, projects, and programs. Becky served on Imagine Chicago's founding board.

Bliss was ordained to the priesthood in 1977, among the first women ordained in the Episcopal church. She concurrently pursued a career in banking, serving as a corporate banker at First National Bank of Chicago from 1975 to 1991. She shared with Becky a strong interest in linking Christian faith and modern economic life.

Bliss graduated from Yale University in 1971 in the first undergraduate class to include women. She received an M.Div. degree from Harvard Divinity School in 1974 and a MM degree from Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management in 1978. Today she lives in Florida. A mother of three grown children, she is an eager playmate for her six young grand-daughters.

MUSICIANS

Mariana Farah is Director of Choral Activities in the Mead Witter School of Music, where she conducts the UW–Madison Concert Choir, Advanced Treble Choir, and Choral Union.

James H. Waldo is lecturer in cello, Mead Witter School of Music, UW-Madison.

Greg Zelek is the Principal Organist of the Madison Symphony Orchestra and Curator of the Overture Concert Organ. Some European cities have a municipal organist. He is as close as it comes to that role in Madison.



Rebecca Margaret Blank was born on September 19, 1955, in Columbia, Missouri. She was the daughter of Uel and Vernie Blank and Grant's younger sister. As a child she lived in Missouri, Michigan, and Minnesota. She graduated from the University of Minnesota summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Science in Economics. After working in Chicago, she completed her PhD in Economics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1983. She held faculty appointments at Princeton University, Northwestern University, University of Michigan, and the University of Wisconsin—Madison, and published close to one hundred articles, including several books. Best known are It Takes A Nation: A New Agenda for Fighting Poverty (Princeton University Press) and Is the Market Moral? (Brookings Institution Press). Her economics work focused on the interactions between low income labor markets, macroeconomics, and government policy. Some of her best-known work was around improvements in the measurement of poverty. In 2021, the American Economic Association gave her the Distinguished Economist award.

At the University of Michigan she became dean of the newly created School of Public Policy, and was instrumental in renaming it the Gerald R. Ford School of Public Policy. She substantially expanded the size of the school and its programs and raised funds to build an iconic building for the Ford School. In 2022, she was given an Honorary Degree by the University of Michigan for her work in higher education and public policy. After serving as dean, she worked at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C., before entering the Obama administration.

She interspersed her academic work with government service and was dedicated to improving public policy and its implementation. While working as a senior staff member on the Council of Economic Advisors (CEA) for the George H.W. Bush administration she met the man she would marry, her beloved husband, Hanns Kuttner. His support was instrumental in making her career possible. She returned to the CEA in the Clinton administration in 1997, serving as one of three Senate confirmed members under Janet Yellen's chairmanship.

In 2009, she accepted the role of Under Secretary for Economic Affairs at the U.S. Department of Commerce, where, among other things, she oversaw the Census Bureau during the 2010 Census. She then moved into the role of Deputy Secretary at Commerce and served more than a year as Acting Secretary. She left in June 2013 for the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

She served as Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison from 2013 to 2022. At Madison she created new programs to fund low income students, expanded faculty and student diversity, led a record breaking fundraising campaign, increased the number of undergraduate students, created a School of Computer, Data and Information Sciences, and successfully navigated the university through the COVID-19 pandemic. Among the highlights

of her time as Chancellor was attendance at multiple college football bowl games, including the Rose Bowl, and two NCAA Final Four men's basketball tournaments. She also worked to improve the administrative functioning of the university and put the university on a sound financial footing. During her years as Chancellor she served on the boards of multiple organizations, including chair of the Big Ten Board and serving on the Board of Directors of the NCAA. She also served on the Board of Governors of TIAA and several higher education and public policy organizations.

Blank was an avid crossword and jigsaw puzzle enthusiast, who also played piano and organ. Her family took frequent hikes and bicycle trips. She was a great fruit pie maker and never lost her love of doughnuts.



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
