












Welcome!


Because of the generosity of the members and friends of the First

The Executive Council acts on behalf of the Membership between Congregational meetings. The Executive Council meets monthly to oversee the budget throughout the year, coordinate board activities, and take on special projects.

The Environmental Justice Group remains an ad hoc group under the Executive Council, and the Council is very grateful for the wonderful work the committee has done to address the opportunities for the Church and its members to care for the earth.



The 320 Lathrop Committee also remains an ad hoc group. This year, the group prepared a Request for Proposals (RFP) for one or all of the current properties: 301 Lathrop (currently a parking lot), 320 Lathrop (currently office space), and 324 Lathrop (currently a parking lot). The deadline for proposals is June 15, 2024, or until acceptable proposals are received.

Throughout the year, the Council spent several meetings discussing ways to ensure First Congregational UCC exists into perpetuity, believing this Church offers a unique view of Christianity.



The Council welcomed Zach Busch as organist/pianist and Christian Rickman as Facilities Technician. The Executive Council is grateful to the staff and the many members serving the Church on the six boards, and those who volunteer in and around the Church.

Congregational Meeting Minutes

First Congregational United Church of Christ - Madison June 25, 2023

11:13 AM via Zoom and In-Person

Moderator Susan Fischer called the meeting to order when a quorum was reached, at 11:13 AM. There were approximately 58 members participating in the Chapel and four participating via Zoom.

Approval of Minutes for June 26, 2022

Cindy Graham/Diane Brockley-Drinkman moved to approve the June 26, 2022 Congregational Meeting minutes as written. The motion passed unanimously.



Budget Report

The 2023-24 budget is balanced and includes a staff pay increase of 3% and paying off the Healing House loan. The biggest difference from the previous year's budget is the \$200,000 of revenue and expenses allocated for the elevator replacement.

The Executive Council moved that the congregation adopt the 2023-2024 FCUCC Budget as presented. The motion passed unanimously.

Amendment to the Bylaws

The church needs to amend its bylaws to formalize the Financial Secretary officer position.

The Board of Stewardship moved that the congregation accept the following amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of First Congregational Church:

Constitution:

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Church shall consist of:

- A. Moderator
- B. Moderator-Elect
- C. Treasurer
- D. Clerk
- E. Financial Secretary

SECTION 2. The terms of the officers shall be one year.

SECTION 3. The Moderator-Elect, Treasurer, Clerk, and Financial Secretary shall be elected by the Membership. The Moderator-Elect automatically becomes the Moderator the following year.

Bylaws

ARTICLE VII. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Principal Officers. The principal officers of the Church shall be Moderator, Moderator-Elect, Treasurer, Clerk, and Financial Secretary. Other officers and assistant officers as necessary shall be appointed by the Executive Council. No two offices may be held by the same person.

SECTION 5 (Addition): Financial Secretary. The Financial Secretary is responsible for the tracking, analysis, reporting, and communication of pledge commitments and payments to the Church, and shall have such duties and exercise such authority as may be delegated or assigned by the Board of Stewardship, the Executive Council, or the Moderator within the scope of the authority of each.

The motion passed unanimously.

This is a very generous Church! The Outreach Board oversees a budget of \$123,600 to spread around our community. Additionally, our Congregation gave \$7,800 to the four UCC special offerings we support each year.

In the community, we attended Pride Magic Fest, collected blankets (two large bins!) for SVdP's "Recycle the Warmth Blanket" drive, and provided 128 backpacks and school supplies to 12 schools and agencies before school started. Outreach also contributes to other missions. See the pie chart for a breakdown of funds.

Our Thanksgiving Meal – delivery and carry-out – prepared and delivered more than 400 dinners to folks in our community. An estimated 250 volunteers helped prepare and deliver meals.


The Prison Ministry Project (PMP)

Rev. Jerry Hancock, Director

It has been a busy and faithful year for the Prison Ministry Project. On behalf of the women and men we serve in prison, and all our volunteers, thank you for the continued support.

Expo Safe House

This year, PMP supported the opening of the EXPO Safe House for five women recently released from prison. PMP contributed \$25,000 from generous bequests from the estate





Certified Peer Support Book Clubs

Again this year the PMP partnered with the Madison Public Library Foundation to provide 450 books for 26 sessions of our Certified Peer Support Book Clubs in Wisconsin prisons. The clubs are a critical source of support for the men and women who provide guidance to other prisoners that only someone on the inside can offer.

Prison Ministry Project by the Numbers

- 46 worship services in five prisons (New Lisbon, Columbia, Taycheedah Oak Hill, Racine). In July 365 people attended worship.
- 121 pastoral visits.
- 30 meetings of the Certified Peer Support Book Groups. In August Secretary Carr, Department of Corrections, stopped by the book club at Stanley as they were discussing The Grapes of Wrath and shared that it is his favorite book.
- 10 meetings of the Discover Odyssey humanities enrichment program.
- · 68 sessions of Restorative Justice.
- 11 advocacy events. The General Synod of the UCC, our national legislative body, adopted a resolution that solitary confinement is torture. The resolution was based on and supported by our solitary confinement cell project.

Safe House Volunteer Reflections

More than a year ago, I sat at my dining room table with Tamra Oman, as she shared with me her dream of providing a safe transitional home to women emerging from prison. Tamra and Deb Mejchar, two dynamic and inspiring formerly incarcerated women... Post-incarceration, Tamra and Deb kept alive the hope that others might be released to a safe space where they could receive support as they navigated the difficult transition to independence and stability on the outside. EXPO SAFE House is the realization of that dream. EXPO SAFE House has become a vibrant, thriving example of community for all concerned! - Peg Wallace

So far our experience has been wonderful. And it is very different from circles inside prison walls! We even enjoy sharing a meal that everyone has contributed to. The RJ circle works as it usually does with everyone sharing stories and thoughts on the "question" at hand. The conversations have been deep and personal. – Janet Pugh

After participating in just three meetings of the RJ circle at EXPO house, I am humbled and amazed. I am in awe of the courage and resilience of the women who are trying to build a new life for themselves after prison and working hard to overcome challenges I have never had to face. I am grateful to be a part of the first RJ program outside of prison walls.

The **Foundation**

The Foundation, as the endowment arm of the Church, receives gifts, invests them, and distributes funds to further the mission of the Church. A Board of Directors, consisting of six directly elected members and five who serve ex-officio, governs the Foundation. At the end of the first quarter of 2024, the Foundation's net assets were \$3,777,775. In addition to the usual annual disbursement to the Church, the Foundation gifted \$50,000 to fund the replacement of the elevator and agreed to match any funds donated to the Church for the elevator project. The Foundation also agreed to provide a no-interest loan to the Church to complete the elevator project. Loan repayment will begin in 2024.

Page Scholarships are available to youth in six area UCC churches. Members of those churches form an advisory committee whose recommendations are reviewed and approved by the Board. The Board approved \$20,300 in Page Scholarships for the year.

The Board also approved a distribution of \$55,500 in Seeds of Hope grants to area non-profits for social justice grants aligned with the mission of the Church.






The generosity of our Congregation remained faithful and strong with a continuing trend of increased annual average pledges providing the resources we need for our missions. However...



2023 Year-In-Review

Wisconsin Conference United Church of Christ

"For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all ... while we wait for the blessed hope and the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ." Titus 2: 11-13

I greet you in the joyful spirit of Epiphany. The words of Titus remind us that between the grace of God that came to Bethlehem in the birth of Jesus and the full manifestation of God's glory on Earth, we in the United Church of Christ are called to bear witness to the love of Christ every day.



The love of Christ is faithful in every generation. Four years after COVID-19 radically changed our lives, congregations are still adjusting to new realities. Many have faced significant declines and are enduring the anxiety that accompanies concerns about sustainability. Yet most have embraced new technologies, and nearly all congregations can point to bright spots of ministry that have unleashed new energy. COVID affected the wider church as well. In early 2023, we made the painful decision to sell the Trost Center in DeForest and shift the Conference offices to Daycholah Center on Green Lake, enabling a closer partnership with United Church Camps Inc. and providing UCCI with a financial boost.

The love of Christ is courageous in the face of challenges. Our associate conference ministers – the Revs. Jane Anderson, Rachel Bauman and Michael Jones -- continue to guide congregations through the search process at a time when the candidate pool is small, and the number of part-time pastorates is increasing. We consider every creative pastoral option and use the leadership and ministry skills courses of the Damascus Project to train future pastoral leaders. The Rev. Dr. Stephanie Perdew, director of the Damascus Project, secured a \$500,000 Lilly Endowment grant that – over the next five years – will widen our pool of learners through expanded course offerings at very reasonable costs. The Damascus Project is the shared educational ministry of the Minnesota and Wisconsin conferences.

The love of Christ demands justice for the oppressed. The justice working groups and Supportive Ministries Team continue to provide resources for local congregations and a collective voice supporting the poor and marginalized. The Damascus Project introduced an implicit bias course, part of our emphasis on anti-racism training. One of our newer working groups – Older Adult Ministries – has produced significant resources for local churches that seek to cultivate deeper connections with seniors. The Creation Care Team, the Immigration Justice Work Group and the Alliance for Justice, which focuses on honoring indigenous peoples, are empowering local congregations with resources to advance these vital ministries.

The love of Christ brings generosity to the world. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, the 210 UCC congregations of the Wisconsin Conference remain remarkably generous. Your support through Our Church's Wider Mission provides three-quarters of the Conference budget and all sorts of resourcing, training, programs and an incredible global mission outreach. We are deeply grateful to all those who have made commitments to the Leadership Forward Campaign. Already, Leadership Forward has received pledges totaling \$1 million. In addition, the Wisconsin Foundation UCC now holds investments of roughly \$17 million on behalf of several congregations and the Conference. The Foundation provides an ideal opportunity for your congregation to achieve excellent financial returns through socially responsible investments.

The love of Christ builds beloved community. In our wider conference life, we are asking this question: "How can we better connect, resource and support each other, as local churches, pastors and lay leaders?" The question has prompted us to rethink church governance structures and to imagine new forms of collaboration. Meanwhile, the staff continues to cultivate care and connection with one another and to build relationships throughout the Conference. At the beginning of 2023 we welcomed ACM Michael Jones and just recently introduced our newest staff member, Carla Myers, who succeeds Susan Taylor as office coordinator. Though Sue is mostly retired, we're happy that she has agreed to work a few hours a week to coordinate the search-and-call process.
