Welcome!

As I near the completion of nineteen years of gratefully serving First Congregational United Church of Christ, I am awed by the commitment of members and friends to live out the Gospel in our community and beyond. Through generous financial gifts and the sharing of time and talents, the boards and staff continue to support the mission of this Church.



This year we have all had ups and downs in our personal lives, but we have also been inundated in the first six months of this year by daily news targeting marginalized people. Nothing has changed about who we are as a Church or how we act on the Gospel, but we must be louder and more attentive to providing **Shelter in the Storm**.

The prophet Isaiah reminded people of God's commitment to loving and caring for those needing refuge – to always being the Shelter in the Storm. You will note many examples of Shelter in the Storm in the pages ahead. Here are a few examples. First Cong...

- Provided over \$23,000 in direct assistance to individuals, including rent, utility bills, funeral expenses, car repairs, clothing or work boots for a new job. Shelter in the Storm.
- Sent over \$70,000 to the Conference and National setting of the UCC to support disabilities, mental health, ministry in the Middle East, environmental work, and new and retired clergy. Shelter in the Storm.
- Supported Restorative Justice and other programming in WI prisons. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided safe worship space for ALL of God's children. Shelter in the Storm
- Provided over 780 meals on Thanksgiving to the community. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided direct assistance to organizations including Healing House, Wisconsin Council of Churches, Mary House (which offers weekend hospitality to low-income women and families visiting inmates in the Federal Correctional Institution at Oxford-WI), Just Bakery, Girls & Boys Club of Dane County, NAMI, GSAFE, and so many others. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided education to children, youth, and adults, offering insight into the struggles and celebrations in our community, state, and national settings. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided fellowship opportunities through the Advent Workshop, Mardi Gras Festival, Newlywed Game, and Pancake Breakfast. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided food or served a meal to The Crossing students and monthly meals at Luke House. Shelter in the Storm.
- Maintained a nearly 100-year building, dedicated in 1930, that houses this Congregation but also provides space to Madison Area Concert Handbells, Stage Q, Madison Jugglers, con vivo, University Avenue Discovery Center, and many others. Shelter in the Storm.
- Provided full-time employment to five employees, and part-time employment to five more. Shelter in the Storm.
- Each of you sat with or walked difficult life journeys with members and friends of First Cong. Shelter in the Storm.

Let us celebrate how First Congregational UCC has not only lived out the Gospel but the promise of the prophet Isaiah – to be Shelter in the Storm.

Executive Council

The Executive Council makes policy, financial, and programmatic decisions for the Church between Congregational Meetings. Voting members include the Moderator, Moderator-elect, Chairperson (or other designated representative) of each Board, plus four Atlarge Members elected by the Congregation. Ex-officio members include the Senior Pastor, Church Treasurer, and Clerk. The decisions made on particular issues are delegated to the appropriate Board or Staff member for implementation.



Currently, the Council has three standing task forces: 320 Lathrop Street, Communications, and Environmental Justice (EJ).



The 320 Lathrop Street Task Force worked – literally for years – to discern the best use of the building. Due to its location in a historic district and its particular style of architecture, as well as the Church's need for parking, their task has been difficult. After talking and negotiating with a few developers, the committee proposed, to the Property Board and the Executive Council, that the Church renovate the house to rent as affordable housing to qualifying students. The next step is hiring an architect to determine the cost to carry this plan forward.

The Communications Task Force worked diligently to address the website, newsletter, internal and external communication, and publicity. The Task Force has not met for some time, as changes have been implemented and are in the capable hands of the Communion Coordinator.

EJ provided multiple learning opportunities and worked diligently in recycling soft plastics. By keeping 1,000 lbs. of plastic out of the landfill, the Church received a new Trex bench.

It has been a smooth operating year despite the outcome of the Presidential Election and the ensuing chaos. After all, we all are in this together. This smooth operation can be attributed to (1) Eldonna's (and the staff's) magnificent handling of the Church's day-to-day business, (2) the strong financial support the Congregation continues to provide to its ministry, and (3) the many volunteers who provide services to the Church, in almost every aspect of the Church's life.

Congregational Meeting Minutes

First Congregational United Church of Christ - Madison June 23, 2024

11:11 AM via Zoom and In-Person



Moderator Levi Hagen called the meeting to order when a quorum was reached, at 11:11 AM. There were approximately 53 members participating in the Chapel and 12 participating via Zoom.

Approval of Minutes for June 25, 2023

Barbara Arnold/Cindy Graham moved to approve the June 25, 2023 Congregational Meeting minutes as written. The motion passed unanimously.

Budget Report

The 2024-2025 budget is balanced. It includes an increase in revenue from building usage and parking income and a staff pay increase of 2%. The new elevator and Healing House loan are completely paid off.

The Executive Council moved that the congregation adopt the 2024-2025 FCUCC Budget as presented. The motion passed unanimously.

Amendment to the Constitution and Bylaws

The church's bylaws currently have different term limits for at-large members of the Executive Council than for other members of boards.

The Executive Council moved that the congregation accept the following amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of First Congregational Church:

Constitution: Article 5: Section 2

The terms of members-at-large shall be two years, and no member-at-large shall serve more than three consecutive terms.

Bylaws: Article 6: Section 2A

No at-large member of the Council shall be permitted to serve more than three consecutive terms in the same capacity.

The motion passed unanimously.

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Board of Christian Education

The Board of Christian Education (CE) supports the Church's mission by nurturing the faith development of people of all ages through educational programming and ministry. The CE Board, with its liaisons to the Accessibility and Adult Education committees, and in collaboration with the Director of Christian Education for Children and Youth, strived to initiate programming for those transitioning from youth to adult life, and intergenerational education to promote growth in faith and the understanding of conflict among religious traditions.








"Opening the Window"

New windows were opened in music ministry during the year! More variety, diversity, inclusivity, and inspiration was brought into our worship spaces, building relationships and supporting musicians, from inside and outside our Church community.

The Family Choir sang "The More We Get Together the Happier We'll Be" for their first service. Even the baby chimed in!

The Handbell Choir grew to 13 and rang for Worship eight times, including a collaboration with the Chancel and Drum Choirs for Palm Sunday.

The Chancel Choir typically consists of 19, singing for Worship 2-3 times per month, and for extra services during Lent and Advent.

The Recorder Group met faithfully and, for the first time, played the Prelude for Worship!

Working towards growth and expansion, Zach Busch and Heather Yonker offered alternative meditative mid-week services. "Be Still & Know."

Unforgettable Advent Organ Reflections. The Sanctuary was transformed with lighting, candles, and projection into the night sky for an organ concert with Zach. It was a tapestry of space and wonder.

Eldonna, Zach, and Heather found sanctuary and flocked to the table at the UCCMA music conference in Greenwich, CT. It was invaluable for inspiration, ideas, and bonding. Keynote speaker Rev. Braxton D. Shelley's plenary, titled "Deep Listening," encouraged us to listen across traditions, promote a willingness to be changed by what we hear, know the music we are supporting, and identify the structures that govern us in worship music. Our Lenten theme of opening the church is relevant in these times. Shelley was leading us to "Open the Windows" and just because the conference and Lent have passed, does not mean we should close them.









Board of Outreach





The Prison Ministry Project (PMP)

Restorative Justice

The Prison Ministry Project has been doing Restorative Justice (RJ) in Wisconsin prisons for almost twenty years. Our programs require no religious affiliation. We do not bring an evangelical perspective to the work. But it is important to understand why restorative justice is so important as a ministry of First Congregational. For us, as a Church, it starts with Jesus.

As Father Richard Rohr says in his book *The Universal Christ*: Once a person recognizes that Jesus's mission (obvious in all four Gospels) was to heal people, not punish them, the dominant theories of retributive justice begin to lose their appeal and authority.

Doing RJ in prison requires us to focus on the harm, not just the crime.

- We show equal concern and commitment to victims and offenders, involving both in the process of justice.
- We work toward the restoration of victims, empowering them and responding to their needs as they see them.
- We support offenders while encouraging them to understand, accept, and carry out their obligations.
- We provide opportunities for dialogue, direct or indirect, between victim and offender.
- We find meaningful ways to involve the community and respond to the root causes of crime.
- We encourage reintegration of victims and offenders, rather than coercion and isolation.

Where we did Restorative Justice Restorative Justice: As you travel the state, keep in your mind and heart the people who are confined in these places. We hope this will help overcome the public policy that people in prison should be kept out of sight and out of mind.



Like Jesus, we are committed to the vision of RJ; committed to the nearly 2,000 victims, offenders, and community members we have brought together to heal.

Board of Property Management

In recent years, the Property Board had projects ranging from replacing the elevator to rehoming a couple of pesky baby raccoons. This last year, with the skills of our Facilities Technician, Chris Rickman, we focused on maintaining and improving our Church home.

You've probably noticed something different by the front entrance – in late August, a driver jumped the curve and flattened the sign that welcomes friends. Fortunately, the driver wasn't injured, but the sign was a total loss. On the bright side, the replacement will be illuminated. Keep an eye on the corner of Breese and University for the replacement that is coming soon.

Summer was a busy time on the 3rd floor finishing the updates in the Sunday School classrooms. Who'd expect to find asbestos in glue holding down



the floor tile? Thankfully, a contractor did quick work on the abatement. The garden entrance also received new flooring to welcome new and old friends.

Speaking of visitors, do you realize how many groups use our space? Here's a quick run-down:

- Madison Area Concert Handbells (MACH) practiced in the Dining Room and performed their 24-25 winter and spring concerts in the Sanctuary.
- Incredible acoustics in the Chapel and Sanctuary provided concert space for con vivo,
 Bobby Joe Valentine, Wesley Bell Ringers (youth from Salt Lake City), and Madison Bach
 Musicians.
- Madison Area Jugglers could be found keeping balls aloft and passing clubs in the Dining Room when it's too cold to practice outdoors.
- First Cong provided a venue for the annual Make Music Madison event on June 21.
- Conscious Contact, an AA meditation group, met weekly in the Fellowship Room.
- Two successful efforts of the Congregation, Healing House and University Avenue Discovery Center (UADC) continue to provide vital services to the greater community.
- During the week you might have encountered a student from LaFollette learning life skills as part of the school's Vocational Transition program.
- The 2nd floor housed a freezer for UW Frozen Meals, helping students with food insecurity. The Church also provided space for two groups who packaged meals for Rally for Hunger.

These are just our visitors – we all shared our time and treasures with regular meetings, book studies, support groups, walking the labyrinth, and choir rehearsals (Chancel, handbells, drums, and recorder). With so much happening, you'd think the members of the Property Board were like one of the jugglers – constantly keeping one too many balls in the air. Instead, we relied on our collective gifts to coordinate, oversee, and get our hands dirty to ensure our church home provides a safe space for everyone. We are grateful for your support and encouragement.

The Foundation

The Foundation, as the endowment arm of the Church, receives gifts, invests them, and distributes funds to further the mission of the Church. A Board of Directors, made up of six directly elected members and five who serve ex-officio, governs the Foundation. At the end of the first guarter in 2025, the Foundation's net assets were just over \$3.4M.

New Century Funds: \$38,900

Page scholarships are available to youth in six area UCC churches. Members of those churches form an advisory committee whose recommendations are reviewed and approved by the Board. The Board approved \$22,500 in Page Scholarships for the year.

The Board also approved the distribution of \$55,500 in Seeds of Hope grants to area non-profits for social justice projects aligned with the mission of the Church.



The generosity of our Congregation remained faithful and strong with a continuing trend of increased annual average pledges providing the resources we need for our missions. However...

there are two concerning trends since 2020, shown on the following charts: 1) The number of pledgers has declined, and 2) The percentage of pledgers and dollars of pledges made by people over 60 compared to pledgers under 60 has increased. It is quite common for the bulk of a congregation's pledges to come from people over 60, but we would like the percentages to remain about the same.



2024 Year-In-Review

Wisconsin Conference United Church of Christ

""Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice." Isaiah 60: 1 and 5

I write this year-end Wisconsin Conference UCC summary on Epiphany Day and send it with prayers of light and love to you and your congregation. This day happens to coincide with the certification of Electoral College votes and the formal election of the next president of the United States. Four years ago, our Capitol was under siege by

people seeking to undermine a free and fair election. This year we pray that the peace of Epiphany will abide. Inauguration Day, Jan. 20, this year coincides with the holiday commemorating the life and work of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. In true UCC spirit, I invite you to pray for the dignity, equality and basic human rights of all who are marginalized or poor or feel unwelcome in this country.

The Epiphany season is about Christ's incarnation through the way we embody the teachings of Jesus. The role of the wider United Church of Christ is to resource, equip and support local churches in this vital ministry of incarnation. We do this in myriad ways, from guiding the Search and Call process and facilitating pastoral authorization, care and oversight; to our Damascus Project coursework and the training we offer on "best practices" for the church; to faith formation retreats and the many justice working groups that are eager to support your church's local efforts.

Sixteen months ago, the Conference Board of Directors and staff met in a retreat setting to begin conversations about the restructuring of our Conference life. Those discussions were an acknowledgment of the challenges inherent in maintaining two midlevel judicatories – the associations and Conference – in a Conference less than half the size of our founding membership in 1962. We wondered if unburdening ourselves of the many committee slots in the current structure might allow us to redeploy volunteer time and talent according to people's passions.

Throughout our conversations with stakeholders two ideas stood out like bright epiphanies – first, our desire to nurture UCC relationships beyond the local church, and second, our desire to collaborate in the sharing of ministry ideas and resources. This reframed the question about structural change from What are we letting go of? to What are we living into? Last fall, after several listening sessions and in consultation with Association leaders, the Board and staff recommended that we dissolve our four Associations at the Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting in June. We have scheduled additional conversations in each Association in late February and early March for the purpose of sharing more details and illustrating the ways in which we might connect and support one another for greater ministry impact.

So far, we have nearly completed the proposal for a unified Committee on Ministry with regional representation. We appreciated the generous mission and scholarship support provided by the Associations and have made provisions for continuing them. We have drafted a new framework for membership dues and are preparing to streamline Association finance ledgers. And we have created a graphic that explains the Conference-wide resource web by showing the connections among our many resource hubs and active working groups.
